Covenant is proud to announce that Pastor Quentin Wallace has a new official title—the Reverend <u>Doctor</u> Quentin Wallace. On May 11, 2018, Pastor Wallace will be graduating from the Doctor of Ministry program from the Palmer

Seminary of Eastern University. Pastor Wallace began the doctoral program soon after his appointment to Covenant. His thesis was "Inspiring a Congregation Through Prophetic Preaching and Teaching to Become Missional Witnesses to Neighbors." His program involved learning new practices for effective ministry in the 21st Century, examining himself as a leader, and understanding the church as a family system. All of this with a goal to enhance the ministry of the local church. We congratulate Pastor Wallace on this important accomplishment in his ministerial career.

In this month's pastor's article, he writes:

Hello Church Family,

I thank you all dearly for your support of my doctoral project that I could not have completed without my Covenant family. As a result, I will be graduating from the Doctor of Ministry program on May 11, 2018, from Palmer Seminary of Eastern University. What I have learned, I intend to use to assist our church in spiritual and numerical growth. To start the process moving forward, the Lord has led the leadership team and me to host a two-night revival on June 7-8. The theme for our revival is "Healing From the Inside Out." Our preacher will be the Rev. Dr. Louis Butcher Jr. (former pastor of Brightside Baptist church). Services will begin each evening at 6:30 p.m. We anticipate a great turnout of our members. Please pray for and plan to attend this revival and expect God to do great things for our church and community as a result.

A native of Lancaster, Rev. Butcher was educated in the Lancaster School System, graduated from Franklin and Marshall College with a Bachelor of Arts in English Literature, from the Lancaster Bible College with a Master of Arts in Ministry, and from Lancaster Theological Seminary with a Doctor of Ministry degree. He has held various positions in the corporate world, including serving as a sales representative and Corporate Employment Manager for Hamilton Watch Company. He spent nearly twenty years as Executive Director of the County Human Relations Commission. He is an organizer of the Bright Side Baptist Church and was its pastor for thirty-seven years until retiring in 2017.

He has served on numerous community boards, including the United Way, South East Lancaster Health Services, Lancaster Regional Medical Center, the Urban League, Leadership Lancaster, LIVE Green, and the Lancaster General Hospital. He is a former Chairman of the Board of the Bright Side Opportunities Corporation, a nonprofit corporation that operates the Bright Side Opportunities Center.

Pastor Butcher has been married to the former Katie A. Rogers for fifty-one years, and they are parents of four children, seven grandchildren, and eight great grandchildren. They were also foster parents for thirty years, helping to raise more than twenty children.

# Here's to Good Health

### **Adult Vaccinations**

Did you know there are adult vaccinations? The need for vaccinations doesn't end after childhood. Every year people die or are injured by diseases that could have been prevented.

While the vaccines you need depend on your health, medical history and risk exposure to illnesses, take a look at what are considered routine for most adults 50 and older.

#### <u>Flu</u>

Flu is caused by the influenza virus; it is a highly contagious viral respiratory disease. This vaccination is recommended for people of all ages. This is an annual vaccination.

#### **Shingles**

Shingles is a painful, localized skin rash, often with blisters. Shingles is

the same virus as chickenpox. The virus remains in the nerve cells after a chickenpox infection. If you have had



chickenpox you could have shingles break out. Many of us have had the vaccine Zostavax, but the CDC is now recommending a newer vaccine called Shingrix. The CDC is recommending if you had Zostavax to talk with your doctor about getting Shingrix. Shingles vaccine is for people 50 and older.

#### <u>Tetanus</u>

Tetanus is a bacterial infection that develops in contaminated wounds. A tetanus booster is recommended every ten years. If you would have a deep dirty wound, you may need a booster if your last vaccination was more than five years ago.

As always talk with your health care provider about these vaccines and if there are any others you should have.
